We are not the only village organisation suffering in this way. I believe the Walking Group, Publunch club and even the W.I., are suffering the same malaise.

Nearly all of these groups involve mostly retirees, so I'm wondering why people have stopped retiring – where are they?

The clubs exist to allow for face to face human contact which I still believe is essential to our well being. The mobile phone doesn't yet make our lunch or keep us fit or create proper friends and friendship – we need to get out and about and meet people.

At bowls we probably talk too much but keep fitter by constantly sitting down, getting up, bending, and walking round the hall. It also exercises the brain in ways you can't imagine. 

We look forward to working with Steve and thank him for joining our council, whilst we say a fond farewell to Tim and his family.



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## On the Farm

True to form the weather has been challenging us again. The extremely wet spell from mid-September to mid-October came right at maize harvest and planting of winter cereals. It looked like a re run of last year. However the anti-cyclone that we have had since then has allowed most field work to have been completed.

The wheat we harvested in the summer is now being sold. We have run into a problem because it contains Ergot and the mill will not buy wheat with Ergot. Ergot is a fungus and, this year, it is widespread in the area; I think weather conditions have favoured its life cycle. It is like a very large black grain. The good news is, it can be cleaned out by a machine called a colour sorter that takes the black ergot out of the beige wheat. The bad news is, it is slow and expensive but it will be what we have to do.

In mid-November we had to complete our TB test. I am pleased to say we had no issues so our herd remains officially TB free. This is good news, especially as quite a few farms locally have got TB issues; for now I believe there is none in the parish.

The big concern and talking point in the farming community is the Budget. There are serious consequences for agriculture (as there will be for any other small family run business). The biggest concern is the change to Agricultural Property Relief (APR). This was established to prevent farming families from having to sell their primary source of income to pay IHT, as it passes between generations. Without APR, smaller farms could become untenable and the family business come to an end. The allowances are not enough. The percentage of 'real working farms' at risk would be very high (the Treasury appear to have included smallholdings and country houses with pony paddocks in their calculations. not just actual working farms).

APR was protecting working farms producing food for the population. Most farms are made up of small family businesses with multiple generations working together producing food and caring for the countryside. The new IHT implications that are being introduced are disproportionate to farm incomes, a farm doesn't generate enough income to pay the tax bill, even spread over ten years. This means land would have to be sold, probably to non-farmers, potentially reducing food production and making the businesses less viable going forward. Food security is a subject that few people in this country worry about, as a nation we are already far from selfsufficient, let's hope in the future it's something people still don't worry about, because its not quaranteed.

Of course you never know when the time will come, so all businesses will be vulnerable in the short term, with people's homes and livelihoods at risk. Older generations are very upset, after years of work the rules are changed and there is little they can do in the short term. These rules are set to change in April 2026, for some the only answer will be to not be still here at that point, we have already heard of this happening. With mental health issues in the farming community already running high this is just going to make things a whole lot worse.

The National Farmers Union is organising a mass lobby of MPs which will involve farmers meeting MPs in Westminster on the 19th November, to make sure they are aware of the implications. There is also a Rally being planned on 19th where farmers are taking British food donations to a London food bank, to take their message to the Government.

On top of IHT there is employers N.I increases, a fertiliser tax, and double cab pick-up tax - a commonly used agricultural vehicle since the Landrover Defender went upmarket.

I listened to Keir Starmer make a speech at the NFU conference last February prior to the election. The talk was of new partnerships, opportunities, the importance of national food security and at one point he said "losing a farm is not like any other business, it can't come back. You deserve better than that". We thought he meant he was going to support farming, I don't think the delegates really understood what he meant and I now realise, neither did he!

We recently had the Chiltern Hills Agricultural Association dinner and annual Competition Awards. We had a good night and picked up the Best Run Small Farm Cup which we had last in 2019 and Best Dairy Youngstock which we last won in 2014. Back in September, Charlotte was asked to be on a panel at the 'Women in Dairy Conference', quite an accolade for her, especially as she was probably half the age of all the other panellists!

We recently inspected our winter bird food crops in awkward field corners (see below). They have done well and should provide abundant small seeds throughout winter. Also, walking our new herbal ley I spotted a four leaf clover. Hopefully it brings some luck! I wish you all good luck and A Happy Christmas and New Year.

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

## **Horticultural Society**

Since the last Hallmark edition we have had our Autumn Show. In spite of a difficult growing year, with a very late and gloomy Spring, things picked up enough to provide a good range of exhibits for vegetables and flowers. The fruit was excellent this year, unlike last year, so as usual the gardening year has been full of surprises!

Well done to everyone who exhibited. We had a good range of exhibitors and the younger growers proved once again that they were as good as any of us older people. That looks promising for the future. We hope that more young people will have a go at showing. It's great fun to see how well your produce compares to other keen growers and there is always plenty of help to learn how to display your veg to its best. The judges look for good condition – freshly picked, clean veg. The uniformity of your exhibits will win over size: if you have three small carrots that look fresh and of similar shapes and sizes, they will win over large, irregular sized, lumpy carrots for example. There is a rule book which we are happy to share if you wish to know more – just

One area in which entries were down on last year was the domestic section. Disappointingly the numbers of exhibits have declined in the last couple of years. Perhaps we have less time for baking? I don't know, but



we do have a great domestic judge who ran a workshop for us on how she judges exhibits. She will also be giving us a demonstration on how to work with chocolate. That will hopefully solve a few Christmas presents. If you enjoy baking do think about having a go and entering next year. Our Spring Show is in March, so plenty of time to practise once we send the schedules out in the New Year.

The weather has of course been a big point of discussion this vear. As I write we have a mild but dull Autumn. There are still plants flowering which I wouldn't expect to see, like Gladioli and clematis, which usually flowers in July/August, plus the usual annuals which go on until the first frost. My perennial Lathyrus latifolius didn't flower until August and carried on until the end of September; its normal flowering time being June/July. Something is definitely happening to our climate and affecting the normal patterns of flowering plants. I just hope that we have more sunlight than we had last winter and spring plus some nice cold frosty sunny days - that would be nice! Good gardening to you all and good health over the winter months.

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


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## **Happy Wanderers**

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## Local History News

#### **Dentists**

Recently I was made aware that now, in 2024, it can be difficult to find a National Health Service dentist. In this case the need included some children.

75 to 85 years ago that would not have been a problem because the dentist came to the school.

Now, if any children are reading this, let me reassure you that the dentists of today would kill the pain, so that anything that had to be done to the teeth would not hurt all that much. They couldn't do that all those years ago.

In 2000 the Local History Group invited past pupils of Lacey Green School to a reunion. 89 former pupils came. They were all given a questionnaire to fill in. There was also a blank space to write about any special impressions that stuck in their mind

You need to imagine the school 75 to 85 years ago, which then only consisted of the old part nearest the Main Road.

Margaret Harris, the policeman's daughter, who lived at the old Graham Cottages and was at the school from 1933-1939, wrote -

"I wonder how many remember the school dentist? Mrs Guerney's office/stock room was used, I still recall the dusty surroundings and the smell of old books. The Harris twins (me and my brother John) had toothbrushes, but still had more treatment than others. Some who didn't have a toothbrush needed no fillings. Our mother was in Barts having a major operation, but oh how I needed a cuddle. Thank goodness dentistry has advanced since then."

Dennis Claydon, who lived in Kiln Lane, was at the school from 1947-1953, he wrote:-

"The visits of the school dentist left a lasting impression. To a small boy of six or seven the dentist appeared to be an elderly, silver haired lady, although she was probably not so elderly!

There was a very big dentists' chair. One had to climb on a box to clamber into this large piece of furniture. The drill was operated by means of a foot treadle, which was very terrifying, there being no pain killing injections. Even today the thought of it makes me shudder!"

Others wrote of the horror of it and how the dentist seemed to work that treadle so slowly.

Dennis Claydon, was the last to mention the dentist. He was six in 1948. The National Health Service was started that year in July. Although this school service was loathed by the children, I can't help thinking they must have had their welfare at heart.

After 1948 it seems that the school left the NHS to get on with it. It is a pity they seem to have a problem in 2024!

I would welcome any comments or information you might be able to provide to add to my media wiki about our local history, such as some information just given to me of how that person's father managed to pull out his own bad teeth.

#### Sunday 1st December - Advent Sunday 10.00am Toy Service

We bless the Advent Wreath and light the first of its candles, the "Hope" candle, the first of three violet candles. The 10am Service on Advent Sunday is also our Toy Service when brand new toys are received to be passed on to the Salvation Army in High Wycombe for the benefit of the children of needy local families. Canon David Williams will be with us for a farewell visit that morning before he and his wife Jo move to Wales early in the New Year. followed by refreshments.

#### 6.00pm Churches Together -**Advent Carol Service**

The Risborough joint service with quest readers from other local churches, followed by refreshments. The collection at this evening service will go to the Lighthouse summer holiday project for children and young people.

#### Sunday 8th December 10.00am service

We light two candles on the Advent Wreath, the second one is the "Faith" candle, followed by refreshments

#### 3.00pm Christingle Service

This is based on a custom brought to this country by Moravian immigrants who came here early in the 18th Century to escape persecution in their homeland.

Making a Christingle begins with an orange representing the world with a red ribbon around it signifying the blood of Christ on the Cross. Four cocktail sticks are added which are said to represent the four seasons or the four points of the compass. To these are added sweets, dried fruit or cherries, in order to remind us of the fruits of the earth. Lastly a candle is added

which is lit, during the Christingle Service, as a symbol of the Light of Christ. In modern times, the Children's Society have adopted the Moravian Christingle custom as a way of raising funds for their work with deprived children and young people in need.

#### Sunday 15th December 10.00 am service Gaudete Sunday,

We light three candles on the Advent Wreath, the third of which is pink in colour and is the "Joy" candle, followed by refreshments.

#### **Sunday 22nd December** 10.00am Service

On the Fourth Sunday of Advent, four candles are lit, the fourth being the candle representing "Peace", followed by refreshments.

#### 6.00pm Service of Nine **Lessons and Carols**

A traditional service with readers from the local community, and well known and loved carols, featuring our wonderful Church Choir, followed by refreshments.

#### **Christmas Eve: 9.30am Holy Communion (Book of Common** Prayer)

Our regular Tuesday 9.30am Said Service which is customarily a modern language Service but, on this occasion, we will be using the traditional 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

#### 3.00pm Crib Service

Our Crib Service, focused on our beautiful crib, is especially aimed at children and families and is by far our best attended service of the whole year, Much loved by children, and with the element of the blessed unexpected only children can bring.



#### 11.15pm Midnight Mass of the Nativity

Midnight Mass of the Nativity begins at 11.15pm and the fifth candle, which is the white Christmas candle, the "Christ" candle, is lit for the first time. This is a very spiritual service, including some of the most glorious hymns and anthems of the season, as usual led by Cher Mole and our dedicated choir.

## Runaway Mum

It's 6am. I step out the door, my belly still warm from coffee, leaving behind the comforting embrace of my home. Darkness envelops me as I take my first step, with only the blinking stars and a silver moon hanging above my head. A thick veil of fog hovers over the dewy grass, and the silence is broken only by the faint call of an owl echoing in the distance. The world around me is still, wrapped in slumber, safe and cozy in their beds.

I inhale deeply, savouring the crisp air as I exhale, watching my breath form a delicate mist in front of me. With a quick reach, I flick on my headtorch, casting a beam into the early morning shadows. Across the field, a pair of shining eyes reflect back at me – fox or muntjac? It seems I have company.

For a moment, I hesitate as the cold cuts right through me - the warmth of my bed beckons, urging me to retreat, to cocoon myself beneath the blankets. But I glance at my sports watch. It's time to seize the day. I press "go", feel my legs respond, and I'm off. The trails are calling.

At the start of the run, my body feels like a cold engine, each stride weighed down by the fatigue of yet another restless night spent trying to locate teddies gone AWOL, and cuddling an unsettled baby back to sleep.

My breathing is rugged, and my heart starts pounding firmly against my chest. My mind buzzes like a crowded beehive, full with thoughts of all I need to do today, the deadlines I can't forget, the places I need to be, the endless juggling act to keep it all together.

My heart gradually settles into a smooth rhythm, my body feels lighter, and my mind slowly releases its anxious, hurried thoughts, surrendering to peace.

Suddenly, I'm fully present, soaking in my surroundings. I hear the crunch of autumn leaves

beneath my feet, the soft rustle of branches as I brush past overgrown hedges, the flutter of birds' wings overhead. The earth gives a gentle squelch under my weight, and the cold air kisses my cheeks, waking me up. 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## Do you like a challenge?

One of the most creative of our village residents must be Fiona Quilter-Wood who lives in the village and is the owner of Fiona Michaels Flowers, and Artistic Director of Equus Productions. Equus regularly stage shows in Lacey Green and other village halls in the area. They will be coming to us in the Spring with a staging of the play based on the well-known book – The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time.

This is the story of an unusual boy who is way out on the autistic spectrum and has trouble relating to our societal norms. He gets involved in a mystery story centred around a murdered dog and the family relationships surrounding it. It will be a massive challenge to interpret the many voices in the book and bring this to the stage, but Fiona is relishing it.

Equus is unusual as the company is not based in one location but does mini tours going into local village halls and theatres for one or two nights and then moving on – quite a challenge! They normally concentrate on putting on serious drama but every few years they do a pantómimé which they stage at Christmas or Easter. Fiona usually directs the plays and sometimes takes an acting role as well, she also writes the scripts for the pantomimes.

Fiona is a long term Bucks resident, being brought up in Gt Missenden and attending the Performing Arts School at Tring Park.


She initially started work in the City in a marketing job which led her round the world organising events.

Finding herself divorced and with three young children, she changed careers to be with her children as much as



possible and, drawing on the qualifications gained in dance and drama, she spent 20 years in a range of prep schools in London and then Bucks as Head of Drama.

Once the children had grown up and left home, she had another career change to set up as an independent florist. She opened a high street shop in Wendover, and developed a



parallel business doing flowers for large events (based on her early event-management experience). This went well, but following Covid she gave up the shop and now continues the business from home here in the village.

Throughout all of this, her dance and drama background still called, and she became involved with amateur musical theatre. She worked with various theatre groups and local theatres in London and then back in Bucks. However, she found that the traditional amateur dramatic societies were not for her and 10 years ago she and two partners started Equus.

This is a bare bones company with just the three directors in executive roles and they pull in actors and stage staff for each production as required – there is no regular troupe of members, although many chose to work with them regularly.

Fiona is also active in other ways in the village. She is the Advertising Manager for Hallmark and pulls in the money to keep us going. She also organises the Christmas Carols in the hall car park and is involved in planning the events for the Village Hall 25th anniversary. In whatever spare time she has left she is a keen countrywoman walking her dogs or riding out across the fields.

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## **Council News**

We are grateful for the support from our residents and for reaching out to us for advice and solutions to problems and concerns.

We continue to encourage community groups to participate in the North West Chilterns Community Board and take advantage of the available funds to carry out projects.

#### **Pension Credit** Surgery

The Council predicts that up to 5,000 Buckinghamshire pensioners who are eligible for Pension Credit are not claiming and could therefore be missing out on benefits of up to £3.900 per year. To help residents who may be struggling with their applications, the Council are holding Pension Credit Surgeries in venues across the county. These will run until Friday 20 December which is the deadline for applying.

There is no need to book an appointment to get support. Residents simply need to bring their National Insurance number, information about any income, savings and investments they have and their bank account details. If applicable, they will also need their partner's information.

## Flood Ready

In October, the new Buckinghamshire Be Flood Ready website launched, providing lots of information on how residents can make their homes more flood resilient. prepare a flood plan, find out what to do after a flood, get advice on insurance and who to contact.

Whilst the forecast is currently drv. more heavy rainfall is anticipated over winter, and the Council are encouraging residents to prepare now.

The Council recommends that residents:

- Check if the area they live in is at risk of flooding
- · Sign up for flood warnings
- · Check what to do during a flood

It is a property owner's responsibility to take appropriate action to protect their own property from flooding, and to look after their property if it does flood.

Please remember that the Council have a limited stock of sandbags intended for use on highways and during times of emergency and will try to assist residents by delivering these to properties at imminent risk of flooding, but this depends on the availability of crews to transport them.

To request sandbags, in an emergency only, view the Council's emergency contact details.


